4th Street Renovations

The Council Bluffs Housing Trust Fund awarded VODEC two grants totaling \$49,000 to complete necessary renovations to the 4th Street Duplex. The renovations being done include an upgrade to the sewer system and remodeling of five bathrooms in need of repair and accessibility updates. Bids were received and Rybin Plumbing and Heating Co., of Omaha, NE was chosen to complete the plumbing and remodeling work.

The sewer system upgrade has included plumbing installation, waste line updates, and removal of the existing cast iron lines, which will be discarded and recycled by Rybin.

The essential bathroom renovations include demolition and removal of the existing plumbing fixtures, installation of a cast iron bath tub, a tub/shower combination, faucet fixtures, an accessible toilet with seat, a wall hung lavatory, new quarter turn shut off stops, supply lines, p-trap, closet bolts, wax ring, wall sheeting, ceramic tile floors and subfloors, tub surround, shower grab bars, the framing lumber, lighting outlets and fixtures.

The repairs to the floors and subfloors will prevent water damage and the installation of the sustainable, eco-friendly in-tub showers, low flow toilets, and new safety measures required for use by persons with disabilities which allows the residents to live in a safer environment.

The trek from the East coast to the West coast was to raise money that contributed to the matching requirement to the Iowa West Foundation grant which is paying for the remodeling of the ATP teaching kitchen and a fitness area for the IA CARES program at VODEC.

The teaching kitchen is currently under construction. When completed, the kitchen is going to help the individuals at VODEC learn to cook simple, healthy meals.

Ride for Full Potential helped to bring awareness about the healthy living challenges of people with intellectual disabilities and VODEC. Ron felt the journey with his son, Matt, was not only great bonding time, but also essential for a good cause. "It's just a way to contribute. We were going to do this, and it was enjoyable for us, a big challenge for us, but why not help somebody else along the way?" Ron says.

Adult Transition Program

ATP will be starting on the 28th of August. We will have one assistant returning (Felisha Neighbors), and one new assistant (Lindsay Putnam). We will also be adding another assistant as soon as we find the right candidate.

“The Adult Transition room will be freshly painted with brighter colors. The new teaching kitchen will be done, and we will make full use of that in our living skills lessons” states Chado Kreo, Day Services Supervisor.

With the construction finished in CARES students will have access to the new fitness, crafts, and computer training rooms.

Many field trips are in the works, which include trips to the Pottawattamie County Jail, City Hall, Vala’s Pumpkin Patch, and the Rottella’s Bakery.

The staff are eagerly awaiting the return of the new students and cannot wait to embark on the new school year!

ATP teaches employment training skills. They develop a resume, learn how to search for jobs, participate in a mock interview, complete a W-2, receive work benefits, learn skills to respect and cooperate with superiors and co-workers, and develop positive work habits (time management).

The students also learn personal health and hygiene skills, money management (payee/purchasing items), how to clean their home and cook their meals. Students learn their rights, learn about insurance (health and renters) and how to search for an apartment/house. Students are provided knowledge on procedures for applying for community resources (food aid, case management, section 8, ect.), how to be safe in their homes and community, and administering their own medication.

Students are taught communication skills in life decision making, phone skills and how to make appointments, following directions, make important life choices, how to interact in public and private situations, discover leisure opportunities, utilize public transportation, how to utilize the library, bank, and shopping centers, develop skills to plan and celebrate holidays and other events, technology skills, go on field trips and much more.

on the floor, standing to bear weight, and taking steps with staff support.

It has been roughly ten years since Susie was able to walk. She continues to work with her therapists to use her walker. Katie works with Susie to get in her stander three times a day to help her strengthen her back and legs and is there to assist in transfers. For the past few months, Susie has been working on taking steps with the Katie’s aid as well as the bench program where she has to maintain an upright sitting position for as long as she can. “To see her come so far since her surgery a few years ago and know that I got to help in any way is amazing” said Katie, “It’s never a dull moment working with her”.

Katie is dedicated in building strong relationships with all the consumers she works with. This is evident to Susie which has given her the confidence she needs and trust in Katie which allows her to feel comfortable when working on these new skills. Katie consistently discusses various programmatic ideas to help Susie continue to progress with her skill level with her supervisors and does a great job of communicating with Susie’s parents

- An applicant must meet the following criteria to be considered eligible for any VODEC service:
1. Be at least 16 years old for any vocational program
 2. Have behavioral needs within VODEC's scope of service
 3. Have medical needs within VODEC's scope of service
 4. Have transportation needs within VODEC's capability to provide
 5. Have adequate funding in place (including service hours authorization or private payment in place) for services being requested
 6. If applying for an in-home service, the applicant's home must meet basic health and safety requirements



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
