Adult Transition Program Graduates Six Students

"It taught me about budgeting and helped me prepare to be on my own more," said Adult Transition (ATP) Student Allison Wilson about her time in the ATP Program. Allison along with her five fellow graduates spoke about the program and what it has helped them accomplish. "It has taught me life skills, community involvement, better control, and how to handle being in the community more," said Brandon Johnson.

ATP is a Council Bluffs Public Schools and Lewis Central Schools program that is facilitated by VODEC. Students from the ages of 18-21 who have completed their academic requirements but still need assistance are enrolled into this program to gain the daily living and social skills they still need to complete the "Transition" to adulthood. While in the VODEC-facilitated program students work on skills such as cooking, cleaning, laundry, vehicle maintenance, and budgeting. They also work on interview skills and resume writing as well as job training by working at the VODEC Development Center or at a community partner. Students also experience community

integration with outings including shopping, museums, entertainment venues, just to name a few. "I get to do a lot of fun things in the ATP program and also learn what I need to live on my own and work as part of a team," said Ian Heiman.

Once students have completed the requirements of the ATP program, Council Bluffs Public Schools or Lewis Central Schools agree that it is time for the student to "graduate" from the program and become a member of the community at large. Many of the students have dreams and goals for the future and this program has brought them one step closer to reaching those goals. "I want to get a community job after graduation and I have already passed my entrance exam for the Marines," said Johnson. Other goals include getting a drivers license, working at VODEC or participating in the Cares program and for one it includes the dream of going to college. "I want to go to college and study art and animation. It is all I want to do and a big part of my life. I love it," said Alfredo Gutierraz.

Most of today's parents are more informed about what's after high school. They know to start the process of accessing adult services years before graduation. They learned who to contact and when and where and how. Most of today's parents of graduates are set. Unfortunately some are not. Some 'didn't get the memo' and are struggling to get adult services lined up.

If you have a high school student with a disability on track to graduate in a few years it is not too early to start the process to access adult services for him or her. Most typical graduates are looking at some sort of employment training or community employment service, and there may be a residential service. Whatever it is, now is the time to make your contacts to have things in place. If you need to know the who, what and how then call 712-328-2638 and ask for Daryn Richardson or Michelle Nelson. Either can get you started.

Some parents first learned about VODEC's adult services from their sons or daughters who were fortunate to have been in a Job Club session by Mr. Richardson in several local high schools. If your school doesn't make this free opportunity available

have someone there call Mr. Richardson.

Some parents learned about VODEC's adult services through their students' participation in VODEC's other in-school programs. Presently these are available only through Council Bluffs Community Schools' high



schools. One of the programs is SEAC which enables students to learn about conducting a job search, preparing for interviews, and getting hired. Another of the programs is Adult Transition Program, or ATP, in which students learn valuable life skills lessons and experience a variety of community integration activities. If you believe your high school could benefit from a SEAC or an ATP program, have someone reach out to Mr. Richardson.

All of this circles back to preparing the access to adult services for a high school-age student with a disability. To know to prepare, one must first know. That's what this article is helping you or someone like you do. If you believe this is targeted at you then it's time to take action. Today.

The committee looks at many different indicators and determines any errors incurred, VODEC's goals to work towards, and a plan of action to reach those goals. Indicators that the committee looked at included: Health and Safety; Outcomes including Health, Census, Satisfaction; Workforce; and Incident Data. The committee set goals for each of the Indicators and put in place plans to reach those goals each quarter. A quarterly report is available to any interested parties at the VODEC Council Bluffs main office.


